

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

him as a strict coach who knows the game of basketball and teaches the game realistically and understandably.







"I have had to learn how to "man up" and deal with the fact that I have a job to do and that job has to be done no matter what", Idy replies. 
What most do not know is that Ioannis' father also played the game of basketball and was highly talented. He was named one of the best players in Europe and played against Michael Jordan many times.

"Giving Has Been the Key to His Life"

On March 27, 2012, Coach William Middlebrooks was named the new Head Basketball Coach at Cathedral High School in Los Angeles, CA. Coach Middlebrooks comes to Cathedral after a stellar career leading the "Fighting Frogs" of Ribét Academy (Los Angeles) to 3 CIF Finals appearances in only seven seasons, winning the 2010 CIF Championship. Middlebrooks leaves Ribét as the longest tenured coach in school history, as well as, becoming the all-time winningest coach in school history at Ribét Academy back in 2009. In addition to his time at Ribét, Coach Middlebrooks won league titles as an assistant coach at Pasadena High School, along with going to a CIF Championship game there.

While at Ribét Academy, Middlebrooks produced several high profile players, including 1 Ball Is Life All-American (Gregory Sequele), 1 MaxPreps Freshman All-American (Tyler Dorsey), 3 McDonald's All-American nominees (Krys Faber, Gregory Sequele and Danovan Price), 1 CIF Player of the Year (Jon Conley), 1 John R. Wooden Award Winner (Jon Conley) and multiple All-State, All-CIF and League MVP selections. When asked, why did you go into coaching? He replied, "I went into coaching because I love the game and the opportunities it provides for young people." When he was injured in college in his sophomore year and needed to stay around the game, he went to Granville High School and asked Head Coach, Keith Wampler, if he could use some help and he brought him on right away. Coach Wampler taught him how to deal with parents and how to teach high school kids that were not elite level players.

Coach Middlebrooks learned his foundation for coaching through experiences as an assistant coach at Granville High School in Granville. OH, Murray Wright High School in Detroit, MI, Pasadena High School, Blair High School and Glendale Community College in Southern California. His only Head Coaching job at a school was Ribet Academy in Los Angeles. He was there for 7 years before coming to Cathedral. Coach Middlebrooks head coaching experience was primarily on the grassroots basketball level with the Compton Magic, Team Odom and I-Can Allstars since 2000, where he won numerous national elite level tournaments. His philosophy of the game of basketball is to always be open-minded. He believes in thinking out of the box and out work the competition. The rest will fall into place.

Coach Middlebrooks believes that defense wins championships. His philosophy is to look for the best five players who can play together at each position. What does he look for in a basketball player? He looks for commitment and a willingness to be coached. Middlebrooks shares, "I can help any kid become a better basketball player if they are committed and coachable."

Coach Middlebrooks has great contacts with many major college coaches. He developed these great contacts with major college coaches because many of them recruited him while he was in high school and later from the success he had as a coach on the grassroots basketball circuit. However, he worked very hard at those relationships. "I am on the phones constantly with college coaches." He visits many colleges as often as possible. He emails college coaches at least twice a month with information on his players. He is truthful with college coaches about a player's talent level and he has been correct in his assessment most of the time, so college coaches trust him and his opinion", commented Middlebrooks.

His relationship with colleges has gone a long way for him. All of the players he has sent to college have started for their teams at one point or another. His training and development has proven to be effective in terms of translating into the college game as well. So essentially college coaches want his players and that has been a blessing for him.

Coach Middleebrooks believes that a great coach is creative, open minded and does what it takes to put their players in the best position possible to be successful. He picks his assistant coaches based on not only their knowledge of the game but their loyalty to him. "I have to go to war everyday and I need coaches with me that I can trust more than anything else."

Coach Middlebrooks has this to say about putting a team on the floor, "When deciding who starts, I am looking not necessary for the 5 best players. Chemistry and an ability to execute our game plans and strategies dictate who starts. I have actually brought the best all-around player off the bench before as a spark and energy guy. That team went to the CIF Championship game. So it worked out well. Ultimately I need a point guard that can run a team, a shooting guard that can really shoot the ball well, a small forward that can defend intensely on the other team's best player and make energy plays in transition. A power forward needs to rebound really well and block shots. My center needs to score the ball well, pass well and be able to run the court relatively quickly, along with being our best rebounder. All 5 guys must be able to defend extremely well and understand lots of different defensive schemes because we change up a lot to find a defense that stifles the opponent. They also must be able to understand game plans because sometimes we totally deviate from what we have been doing all year based on the scouting report for an opponent. Guys cannot be robots and must be able to really play the game and understand the game."



Coach William Middlebrooks wanted to coach basketball when he entered college. He had his own ideas about how to play the game and be successful. He did not agree often when the philosophies of his coaches. He saw some things that he thought were different and unique. That has been a big part of his success to this day. He creates his own plays and game strategies. He runs many things differently than most coaches. He never goes to Coaches Clinics or takes plays from other people. "I try to be as creative as possible, based on the strengths and weakness of the players I have."

Middlebrooks has always had a very personal relationship with his players and parents. He believes his program is about them. They sacrifice a lot to play for him. He also feels it is important to develop a family over the years with the alumni, players and parents which means the most to him. Middlebrooks believes, "Championships are meaningless if we don't love each other and care about each other."

William Middlebrooks was born and raised in Detroit, MI. His grandmother was the number one influence in his life. She was always there for him. She didn't have much but what she had she shared with him. He learned to be a giver from her. Giving has been the key to his life. He is a living example of the Biblical scripture, "Give and it shall be given unto you, pressed down, shaken together, running over, shall men give unto you..." At the age of 23 years old, he came to Los Angeles to become the General Manager of Grace Records, the largest independent gospel label in the country at that time. His first coaching job in Southern California was at Pasadena High School. His son was playing for the team and Coach Tim Tucker asked him to come in and meet with him. He went to meet with Coach Tucker thinking it was an issue with his son and Tucker asked him to join his staff as an assistant coach. He stayed there for four years.

Middlebrooks started playing organized basketball in the 6th grade. He played on a travel team for the Police Athletic League (PAL). He became interested in basketball through his best friend, Liyongo Tolin, who got him on the PAL traveling team. Liyongo is the cousin of George Gervin, who played at Eastern Michigan University and then for the San Antonio Spurs.

Middlebrooks stopped playing organized basketball during his freshman year of high school in order to play travel ice hockey. Bill Robinson got him back into organized basketball in the 11th grade. Bill was the first Division 1 African American Head Coach in the history of the NCAA. He coached at the University of Illinois-Chicago. Middlebrooks was the first member of his family to play organized basketball. He attended two different high schools.

During the 9th and 10thgrade, Middlebrooks attended Cass Tech in Detroit, MI and for 11th and 12th grade, he attended University Liggett School (ULS) in Grosse Pointe, MI. He played basketball at ULS, where during his senior year in 1987 he led his team to the first league championship in the history of his high school, which at the time was more than 80 years old; unfortunately they fell short of the State Championship. That was when he knew he loved winning championships. "It was amazing to watch how excited and proud our entire community was just from winning basketball games; how much fun it was for the fans," stated Middlebrooks.

He attended college at Denison University in Granville, OH and majored in Psychology and Physical Education. He chose those majors because he wanted to be a college basketball coach and he believed that it was important not only to understand the basic principles of physical education but also the mental aspects of human nature that would allow him to motivate players more effectively and scientifically than his peers. While at Denison University, he played basketball. Unfortunately, he blew out his knee as a freshman and it ended his career early during his sophomore year. What he learned from his injury was the importance of strength training and a need for a program to have the best of everything, including doctors, trainers, equipment, facilities, nutrition program and financial resources. According to Middlebrooks, "in many cases injuries can be prevented as a result of excellent training. When injuries do happen, a well-trained athlete bounces back much faster. A major emphasis of mine is injury prevention through strength training, proper diet and hydration."

Coach Middlebrooks picked Cathedral High School because of the commitment he saw in the President, Martin Farfan and the Principal, Brother John. Administrative support is an important key for any basketball program to be successful. "I had to be with people who were on the same page." Middlebrooks also believes that having parent involvement in a student's basketball career is important. He emphasizes, "Kids may act like they do not want their parents around, but the truth is they do. They just do not want their parents going crazy and bringing negative energy. They just want their parents to support and love them as well as their teammates."

Coach Middlebrooks has no interest in coaching in college. He believes, "High school is the best opportunity to develop and mentor student athletes for the future." He hopes Cathedral will be his last job. He would like to accomplish at Cathedral a quality a program that the entire community will be proud to call their own.

According to Middlebrooks, "My goal is to build an internationally recognized program at Cathedral that produces genuine student-athletes. I have been, and will always be, an academics first coach. I will always be a 'do things the right way' coach. There are no shortcuts to success. From my perspective, basketball is merely a tool that creates opportunities for those that are committed enough to take advantage of it. The likes of Dave Bing, Magic Johnson and Kevin Johnson are living proof of this. Basketball gave them a platform and financial base that they took to the next level. I want my players to do the same thing, all around the world. And I want my players to work together forever, beyond the court."






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
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Cathedral's 1972 Varsity Basketball Team Wins First League Title Since 1929

It took the Cathedral varsity basketball team 43 years to win a league title in 1972. The last league championship was in 1929 just four years after the school had opened. For so many years, Cathedral's Varsity basketball team had come so close in winning a league title as a Division 1 school, which was the highest division of 4 divisions in the California Interscholastic Federation (CIF) Southern Section. During this time there were only Four CIF Divisions which over time has increased to over ten. Cathedral was always considered to have an outstanding athletic program with a small school enrollment of less than five hundred students competing against schools that had as much as one thousand or more students.

Cathedral always had very strong competitive teams in the Catholic League, but it was challenging to compete against teams like: Loyola, Notre Dame, Mt Camel and Pius X. 
Their new coach was John Moor, who graduated from Loyola High School and played on their varsity basketball team for two years in 1963 & 1964. He learned his basketball and coaching skills from a former Phantom Bill Sanchez '51 who coached him at Loyola. The team wasn't tall, but their speed and defense was the difference and they could shoot from anywhere on the court. Coach Moor bought out the best in each player and formed a team concept.

This team featured four players that averaged in double figures and the fast break was the name of their game along with the outstanding shooting and strong rebounding for a below averaged sized team. They played well together and built on each other's strengths. This team was unselfish and they always found the open player on the court. Their quickness on defense and offense led to turnovers and fast break baskets. Their spirit and drive of the game renewed the enthusiasm and excitement of the student body and fans that had been missing for many years in the old gymnasium.

There were six seniors and four juniors on this outstanding team. The starting seniors were Jose Gonzalez (guard), Paul Montoya (forward), Frank Garcia (center) who was the team captain and John Perez (guard). The seniors coming off the bench were Jose Huerta and Mario Pacho. The only junior that started was Jose Largespada (forward), who was the league's M VP. The other juniors on the team were Brian Evans, Peter Tostado and Larry Elizalde. The floor leader of the team was John Perez who led the fast break along with double digit assists per game.

The 1972 Phantoms lost their first two games in their new season against two very good schools in St. Monica and Mt Carmel. After beating Culver City in their third game by 21 points, they went on to win the Murphy Tournament beating Salesian, St. Monica and St. Bernard's. In the Murphy Xmas Classic Tournament, they beat Loyola and Harvard Westlake. Prior to league play, they beat Damien, Alemany and Loyola again 60 – 48.

There was balanced scoring on the team with Jose Largespada, averaging 18.0 pts, Jose Gonzalez 18.0 pts, John Perez 15.2 pts and Paul Montoya 14.9 pts. The leading rebounder was Largespada who averaged 13.2 per game followed by center Garcia at 11.7 rebounds per game and Montoya at 10.5. The leading assist leader on the team was Perez with 10.5 per game. The Santa Fe League Champions lost one league game to St. John Bosco and later beat them on their home court in the final league game 57 – 47. The Phantoms




Jose Largespada handling the ball.

accomplished a record of 26-8 going into the CIF playoffs. Their first opponent was Valencia, who they beat 66 - 64 and then followed a second round win in a thriller over Gladstone 54 - 53. In the quarterfinals the Phantoms lost to Daniel Murphy 73 - 56. The Phantoms ended the season with a 28 - 9 record.


The outstanding play of the 1972 Phantom Championship Team led to the honoring of Jose Gonzalez and Jose Largespada making the Santa Fe All League First Team. Making the Second Team All League was John Perez and Paul Montoya. The Phantoms wouldn't win another league championship until 1978 which included Cathedral's first CIF championship. Then ten years later, the Phantoms went on to win five straight championship from 1988 - 1992v

John Perez was one of the best complete ballplayers, Cathedral has ever produced, who could do it all; quick and lead the fast break, great passer, tough defender and midrange shooter. He was a great leader on the court and had an upbeat positive attitude. He was the engine that drove the squad with fierce competitiveness and the drive to win. John Perez was a three year varsity letterman in basketball and all-tournament in his senior year in the Santa Monica and the Murphy Classic.




